Believe it or not the first Temple Christmas parade meeting is set for August 20th. TARC will again be helping with staging and is in need of volunteers.

5th Circuit Court rules against FCC

*Not amateur radio related but I chose to include it anyway.

The 5th Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled that the FCC erred in how it implemented the Universal Service Fee passed by Congress. The court ruled that the fee is in essence a tax. The FCC, rather than setting the fee (tax) itself, granted fee (tax) setting duties to a private third party, the Universal Service Administrative Company. The court ruled that this action is unconstitutional.

Judge Oldman wrote for the court: In the Telecommunications Act of 1996, Congress delegated its taxing power to the Federal Communications Commission. FCC then subdelegated the taxing power to a private corporation. That private corporation, in turn, relied on for-profit telecommunications companies to determine how much American citizens would be forced to pay for the "universal service" tax that appears on cell phone bills across the Nation. We hold this misbegotten tax violates Article I, § 1 of the Constitution.
